#### INLAND GREENS HOA RECOMMENDED PLANT LIST

(Developed in cooperation and consultation with the Arboretum staff, NCSU Cooperative Extension Service, Five Oaks Nursery and The Transplanted Garden)

### Goals:

Low maintenance (to reduce future expenses)

Low growing (to not block sight lines and reduce pruning expenses)

Drought tolerant; hardy in this zone

Perennials (for flowers vs annuals – to save future expenses and the plants reproduce)

Colorful and attractive; good for butterflies and birds

Native, hardy plants

Evergreen shrubs /grasses for screening utility boxes

# **Shrubs** (choose dwarf, if available):

Encore azaleas – evergreen, low growing, color – bloom more than once, good screening Recommend: Autumn Angel (white; 3'x3'); Autumn Empress (fuscia; 4'x3')

Knock-out roses – good color, hardy, only prune once (in winter)

Nandinas – "firepower" for driveway dividers

Butterfly bushes – dwarf

Camellias – esp. sasanqua

Cypress gold "mop" or fernleaf – good low-growing (3') screening plant

### **Small Trees** (with small root systems to not harm foundations and fences):

Crepe myrtles, Hollies – yaupon or Nellie Stevens, oleanders, japanese maples

#### **Grasses:**

Lomandra "Breeze" – evergreen and low-growing; good screening

Muhly - 3 ft. high

Miscanthus

Adagio - 4 ft high

Little Kitten – 1-3 ft.

Gracillimus and Cosmopolitan – 6-8 ft. (may be too tall for many areas)

Dwarf – 3-5 ft.

Mondo grass – tough, low, dark green, spreads, holds soil – good for driveway dividers

## **Perennials:**

Gaura

Stella d'oro day lilies (small, yellow)

Snapdragons; black-eyed susans; russian sage; plumbago; salvia (indigo spires);

homestead verbena; some lantanas; mexican sage bush

#### **Annuals:**

Diamond frost; pentas; pansies; vincas; some lantanas; angelonia

Fall 2009
